Did you know that Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park is home to some cute new residents?

Thanks to the Marna Banggara project, brush-tailed bettongs have returned to southern Yorke Peninsula. They were missing for more than 100 years due to foxes, feral cats and habitat loss.

Brush-tailed bettongs - called yalgiri by the Narungga people - are soil engineers. They turn over the soil, spread seed, compost leaf litter and grow new plants. Clever little marsupials!

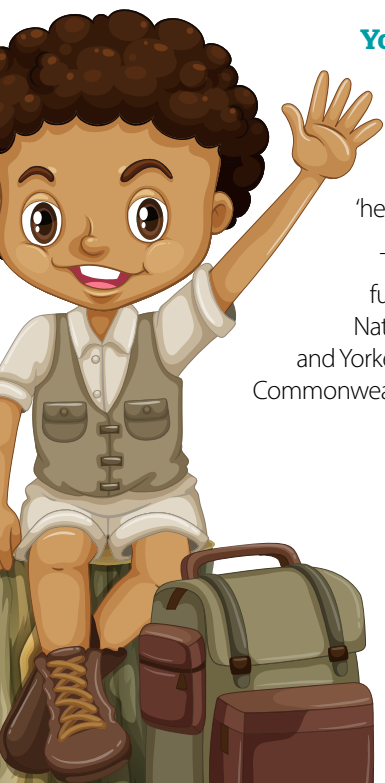

Marna Banggara comes from Narungga language. Marna means 'healthy' and banggara means 'Country'.

While you're in Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park, you can help keep our Australian wildlife safe and discover something new.

Here are our tips:

Tip

Help the brush-tailed bettongs in the park by driving slowly, especially at dusk and dawn when they're out foraging for food.

Tip

Look out for bettong diggings in the park. They love to dig and can turn over between 2 and 6 tonnes of soil every year! This helps spread seed for new plants to grow.

Tip

Are you visiting the beach on Yorke Peninsula? Hooded plovers are endangered beach-nesting birds that lay their eggs in the sand and are really hard to spot. When you go to the beach, walk on the wet sand, keep your dog on a lead and be cautious when driving on the beach.
